idea that those who practice humility are plagued with a deep-seated weakness or have a flaw in their human condition.

The idea of humility was probably just as hard to grasp during Old Testament times as it is today. So when Micah was inspired to pen his infamous passage about walking humbly with God, was he alluding to the fact that God requires us to be comfortably vulnerable and contentedly selfless? Well, yes.

To walk humbly with God simply means that on our life-journey we are grounded in the truth, knowing that God is God and that we are God's faithful followers. In other words, to walk humbly implies that our relationship with God is the centerpiece of our journey.

To walk humbly with God also means that we must journey respectfully, equally, and authentically with all of our sisters and brothers as well. Such a gracious attitude neither allows room for a private agenda nor a notion to be number one. Thus, when put into a daily practice, walking humbly with God means to put aside self-interests in order to serve God and our brothers and sisters wholeheartedly.

When we reorient ourselves to this reality, it deters us from making ourselves, our accomplishments, possessions or status the focus of our journey. Instead, it puts God and other people at the center. When looking at humility this way, we find that this isn't really considered weak or maladaptive, but rather a very powerful way to live.

The 2007 Annual Conference logo seeks to capture this idea of a humble journey with God and others. Look at the individual feet portrayed —some are young, some old — some are covered in beautiful shoes, some are covered in shabby sandals or no shoes at all — some are traveling to the right, some to the left, some down the center and some standing still. This is to symbolize that, as God's people, we all are different and unique — just as all of our life-journeys



are different and unique and take us in different directions.

Notice, too, how the individual squares aren't closed-off. They are open boxes indicating that, while on our life-journey, we must remain open to one another. Also notice the simple and transparent mist and stars that sweep through the squares. This represents God's grace and love that saturates us with love, hope, peace, understanding and forgiveness wherever we are on our individual life-journey. If you look closely, it almost looks like a well-traveled pathway.

During this Annual Conference Session, let's celebrate our humble walk with God and with one another. Let us affirm one another's journey and remember that if we truly follow Christ's example, then humility will be a way of life.
