Responding to our Changing Community

The past week has been a real joy for me. My wife returned from a two-week visit with our oldest son and his family in Japan. That was enough to make my week but she also brought our four and a half year old grandson back with her. He is fluent in Japanese and English and has more frequent flyer miles than most of my peers. He is not only brilliant but he is also handsome and especially gifted. Okay, enough grandparent talk.



It is so obvious that the world is a very different place than it was just a few years ago. We live in a culture that is very diverse and rapidly changing. Three weeks ago an elaborate Hindu temple opened in the Atlanta suburb of Lilburn. The 27,243-square-foot temple is set on 30 acres and features Italian marble and Turkish sandstone which was shipped to Rajasthan state in western India, where artisans carved intricate designs into each block.

According to newly released census data nearly one in five people living in the United States speaks a language at home other than English.



The estimates from 2006 show the number of immigrants nationwide reached an all-time high of 37.5 million that year. In the 28-county Atlanta metro area, the number of Spanish speakers grew by 53 percent from 2000 to 2006. Spanish speakers now total 8.5 percent of the metro area's population, up from 6.9 percent in 2000. The metro area's Asian-language-speaking population has also grown in the past six years, going from 2.3 percent of the total in 2000 to 2.8 percent in 2006. Recently I asked a retail store clerk a question and she replied with a strong eastern European accent, "I'm sorry but my English is not very good." I answered, "And my Russian is terrible."
