“I have been blessed.” That is how Rosalynn Carter describes her life as she celebrates her 80th birthday. She says she would like to slow down but the world keeps calling. She adds, “There are so many important things to do.”



Carter counts her marriage and her family among her blessings. Of course, she also acknowledges the exceptional opportunities she is afforded because she was the first lady of Georgia and the first lady of the United States. But instead of simply enjoying the privileges those honors afford, she says these have “given me the opportunity ... to have some influence.” She has used that influence to push for mental health reforms and has become a leading voice on the issues.

Another celebration of longevity and opportunity was celebrated last weekend as Atlanta-based Bronner Bros. Inc celebrated its 60th anniversary. It has become one of the world’s largest African-American Christian-based companies and continues to prosper as many others in the hair care products industry have failed. The reason for its success is because they have operated with a business model that puts God first, family second and business third.
