Prayers, Presence, Gifts, Service, Witness

“Will you be loyal to the United Methodist Church and uphold it by your prayers, your presence, your gifts, and your service?” That is the question persons have been asked for decades when they become members of a local congregation. That will soon change.

The recent General Conference voted to revise the membership vows. The new language becomes official January 1, 2009 but some churches are already using it as new members are received. Persons seeking membership will now be asked to “be faithful to Christ through the United Methodist Church with your prayers, your presence, your gifts, your service, and your witness.”

Lyn Powell, immediate past Lay Leader for the North Georgia Conference and leader of the General Conference Delegation, said this is the result of three years of conversation among lay leaders across the denomination. Discussion

centered around “accountability of laity to be witnesses in their community and how to bring the community into the church.”

The Association of Conference Lay Leaders sought to call the laity into ‘accountability for the renewal and vitality of the United Methodist Church,’ according to Powell. So they brought a petition to General Conference to change the membership vows. The idea received an enthusiastic reception and the vote was overwhelmingly favorable.

The intent of the additional language was to place emphasis on commitment to Christ that was lived out through the Church. Lay Leaders hoped this would then cause people to ask the question, “What should one do or not do to be a witness for Christ?”

Jesus called his followers to be “witnesses to me” as the Holy Spirit empowered them. He instructed his disciples to “tell people about me everywhere” (Acts 1:8, NLT) and the Holy Spirit would provide the “power, efficiency, and the might.” Witnessing for Christ means being intentional in actions and speech.

Serving a meal at a soup kitchen, tutoring a child, helping repair the home of an elderly person, mentoring an adolescent, visiting the residents of a nursing home, providing medical care for those who can't afford it, advocating for children and the poor, lending an ear to one who is lonely, having integrity in business- these are only a few examples of how we can share our "witness" for Christ.

In a recent conversation I discovered someone that liked Mexican food. It was not awkward or uncomfortable to respond by telling them



about a restaurant I thought they would enjoy. If we believe that Christ makes a difference and the Church is important, it should be just as natural to verbally share that with others.

Being a witness for Christ is not a new concept but maybe we need to revive the idea that it is natural to share our faith with others in word and deed. It does not require a formula nor does it imply imposing one's ideas on another unwilling person. You don't have to be pushy or confrontational. Anyone with a relationship with Christ and the Church can simply speak to others out of their experience. Be alert to the opportunities that will arise to show and tell others about Jesus and invite them to church.
